In association with London's Victoria & Albert Museum, the Bard Graduate Center Gallery is presenting the first retrospective of the influential Arts and Crafts designer John Lockwood Kipling (1837-1911). The exhibition features 250 pieces, including this circa-1863 lead-glazed earthenware jug (above). "John Lockwood Kipling was one of the unsung heroes of the Victorian Era," says Susan Weber, the show's co-curator. "We hope that visitors discover his deep talent and important contributions to the decorative arts."
